#### Head's Update:

Dear Parents/Carers,

Although busy, this is such a lovely time of the year to be in school. We have been fortunate enough to see Year One and Two's production of 'Midwife Crisis'. A huge thank you to the children for their beautiful singing and their confident performances, it really was superb. Last week, we were equally as lucky to see our youngest pupils in the school, Reception and Nursery, perform the Wriggly Nativity. Once again, the singing was fabulous, and the children did an amazing job, sharing their version of the birth of Jesus. On the theme of performances, Years five and six had the opportunity to go to the School of Rock in London last week. This is part of our commitment to enriching the children's experiences and curriculum. What an amazing performance it was and if you get an opportunity to see it, definitely go. We have had a focus on respecting the environment and the Year 6 children were horrified to find out that Christmas wrapping paper cannot be recycled. Three million tons goes into Land Fill at Christmas. Inspired to make a difference, they set about making their own recyclable wrapping paper and decorations. Thank you for purchasing their products and being part of protecting the environment.

Year six children have been very busy, as they also went to see a Cybercrime theatre production. Our Head Boy said about the performance, 'I learned so much about what you shouldn't put on line and what you can do to prevent Cybercrime e.g. set your privacy settings to only your family and friends, and think about what photos you post, as it may give away personal information – leaving a digital footprint. ## Year 2- Autumn 2 2018

The children have settled well into Year 2 this term and began exploring the topic of 'Fire and Ice'. As part of the term, children wrote their own stories of the Gingerbread man and re-enacted the Great Fire of London through some amazing drama. To understand the causes of the fire, the children made houses from 1666, created the narrow streets of London and then set fire to them in the orchard's fire pit.

The Fire Brigade from Caversham fire station came to visit us and explained how nowadays fires are put out and how we can keep ourselves safe. Everyone's favourite part was when we were allowed to hold the hose!



As part of our science topic on Changing Materials, both classes went to Pizza Express in Bracknell where we learnt how to make pizzas. We learnt the skill of stretching our own pizza dough but we left the throwing and catching method to the chef!

Hopefully, Year 2 parents all had a chance to see our play, "A Midwife Crisis". All the children enjoyed learning the songs and dances and the actors worked incredibly hard at leaning their lines and confidently performing on stage. May we thank you all again for the fantastic costumes which were sent in, as without your support the show would not have been complete.

#### Year 3 – Autumn 2 2018

In English, we have created our own sound poems and are now confident with onomatopoeia and in Maths we have been focusing on recalling multiplication facts at pace.

This term we visited The Pitt Rivers Museum and had fantastic fun seeing all of the Egyptian artefacts, opening drawers full of exciting objects and viewing the mummy. We also got to explore the natural history area.











Egypt was one of our topics this term. Alongside exploring 'There's a Pharaoh in my Bath' in Guided Reading, we entered the Lower Earley Scarecrow competition and our Pharaoh scarecrows were displayed in Asda.









Finally, to end a fantastic term, we completed our topic with an Egyptian day. The children wore wonderful costumes and we participated in Egyptian activities including; mummification, dancing and painting our carefully sculptured Canopic jars.














## Year 4 – Autumn 2 2018

In Geography, Year 4 have continued learning about our extreme earth with a focus on Volcanoes. We built collaborative sculptures of volcanoes and learned all about how they are formed by the movement of tectonic plates. They even learned some dance moves to help them remember! The children used the recent Tsunami in Indonesia as a case study to understand how to help those effected by natural disasters, which inspired valuable discussions and pieces of writing.









During DT, the design brief was to make an electrical toy for the Christmas market. The children researched toys with electrical parts and made their own designs based on their research. After exploring the benefits of different materials, they made their own prototype.











The production of The Wind in the Willows at the start of the half term, was a fantastic performance. All the children worked so hard to learn their lines, their dance routines and songs. They demonstrated so many school values with such dedication and independence. We had such positive feedback from the audience, well done to all the children for putting on such a brilliant production.













## Year 5 – Autumn 2 2018

#### What have Year 5 been up to this term?

This term, we have immersed ourselves in our topic of the Vikings. Year 5 enjoyed a visit from Peter the Merciless and got into character with some amazing costumes. On Viking day, we made Viking coins, and investigated a wide range of artefacts. Our DT topic involved designing, creating and testing our very own Viking longboats. We saw some great collaboration and determination to find the best materials for success sailing! We were extremely impressed by the amazing effort that all of Year 5 put into their Viking long houses – well done.

Year 5 began the term by investigating materials for boats and viscosity of liquids in science. The children worked hard to develop the scientific vocabulary to plan, carry out and evaluate a fair test. In Autumn 2, Year 5 have learnt all about the exciting topic of Earth & Space.

Our writing has been inspired by Year 5s' love of Harry Potter and the dark arts. We have created our mythical creatures to write mysteries stories and non-chronological reports about. We have thoroughly enjoyed reading Harry Potter in our Guided and Shared Reading sessions, sparking many interesting discussions about life and magic in Hogwarts!

It is hard to believe that we have reached the end of the term already! We have thoroughly enjoyed teaching all of the Year 5s and hope you all have a lovely relaxing Christmas.















## Year 6 – Autumn 2 2018

### What have Year 6 been up to this term?

What a busy term we have had in Year 6! The children all settled in well quickly and have covered a huge range of topics.

In English, we started off with some narrative writing, before moving swiftly on to look at Alfred Noyes' poem 'The Highwayman'. We had many opportunities during this unit to explore the imagery and language through art. Since, we have worked to develop our grammar knowledge and have produced some beautiful pieces of writing, stemming from the video 'The piano'. This video tells the story of an old man's life, through flashbacks of his childhood, relationships and, our new topic, the war.

Both classes have been showed great interest in our war topic and have looked into why the war started, significant figures, propaganda posters, life in the trenches, recruitment and even conscientious objectors. We will be continuing this topic after Christmas, with a specific focus on World War Two.

Perhaps one of the most exciting highlights from the Autumn Term, was year 6's involvement in the 'Hillside Rocks' project. Between both classes, the children painted 100 poppies on rocks, to commemorate the 100 years since the end of the First World War. These rocks were then hidden in the local area and beyond for residents to discover and re-hide. The children really enjoyed seeing where their rocks ended up, one of which made it to the Sahara Desert!

We can't wait to see what the Spring term brings and we'd like to thank all of the Year 6s for their hard work and dedication. Have a great Christmas break.
